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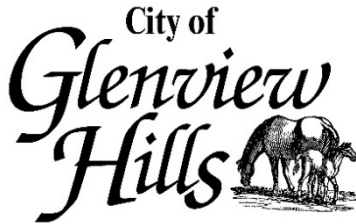

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 PM.

Mr. Veeneman presented the financial report and balance sheet. Mr. Veeneman discussed transferring funds from PNC bank to keep account balances below the FDIC threshold. Mr. Veeneman discussed an investment program through PNC and the Kentucky League of Cities. Mr. Veeneman will invite Mr. Mark Snyder to attend the next meeting to provide information about this program. Mr. Veeneman continues to make efforts toward appropriately reporting ARPA funds.

Attorney Strobo informed that he had been working on the AT&T Fiber issues and that he believes that while some mistakes were made, everything is now progressing as expected. Attorney Strobo reports that there have been no recent developments on the Cabin Way case and no further action is needed.



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The council discussed the neglected cemetery in the neighborhood, which has been poorly maintained for many years. Council members report that the cemetery is approximately 30-40 feet wide and 75-80 feet long and contains approximately 20-25 graves. It is believed to be owned by a dissolved company called Pioneer Preservation. Attorney Strobo suggested that maintaining the property might be considered trespassing, but it would likely not result in legal action. Attorney Strobo discussed researching tax lien options to potentially transfer ownership to the city. The group agreed for Attorney Strobo to check PVA records to verify ownership details. Commissioner Baker agreed to get a quote from Jack Sherman to clean up the cemetery.

The council discussed the front entrance project, including replacing trees that have been cut and possibly planting Arbovitae along the front entrance to provide additional privacy for residents. Trees Louisville has not contacted the city.

Commissioner Bird discussed placement issues with the Flock security cameras. Commissioner Bird is working to negotiate a credit with Flock since they chose the installation site. The council determined to hold off on payment until the issue is resolved. Mayor Green inquired about a bill owed to Cardinal Survey for a survey of the front entrance. The council approved paying the bill.

Commissioner White discussed the neighborhood paving schedule. The schedule is arbitrary and the council can review the roads and determine if any are in need of paving at this time. The city cannot afford to pave all the roads at the same time. The council agreed to rely on Mr. Veeneman in assisting with a paving schedule that is affordable to the city.

The council approved getting Christmas lights for the front entrances if the cost is reasonable.

The council was reminded that beginning in January, meetings will occur at 8:15 a.m. on the second Monday of the month.
